Archaeological survey-cum -excavation for Central Police Station (CPS) Conservation and Revitalisation project by the Hong Kong Jockey Club (HKJC)	In accordance with the requirements of the Environmental Permit (EP-408/2011) and Planning Condition (TPB/A/H3/399) laid down by the Town Planning Board, HKJC is conducting an archaeological survey-cum-excavation with a permit granted by the Antiquities Authority under section 6 of the Antiquities and Monuments Ordinance (Cap. 53). HKJC conducted an archaeological investigation in 2011 which identified areas of high, medium and low significance in terms of their archaeological potential and heritage values. The remains of high heritage significance will be preserved in situ while those of less heritage value will be recorded in details, which is an internationally adopted conservation approach.
