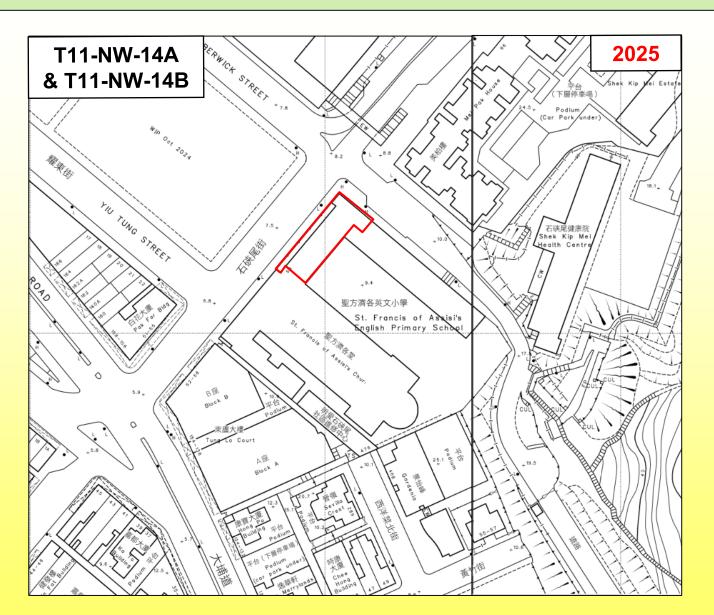

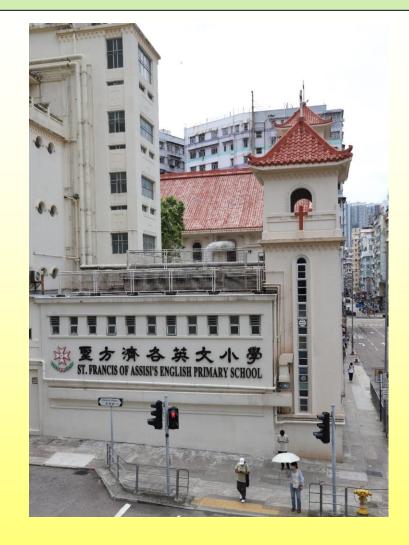

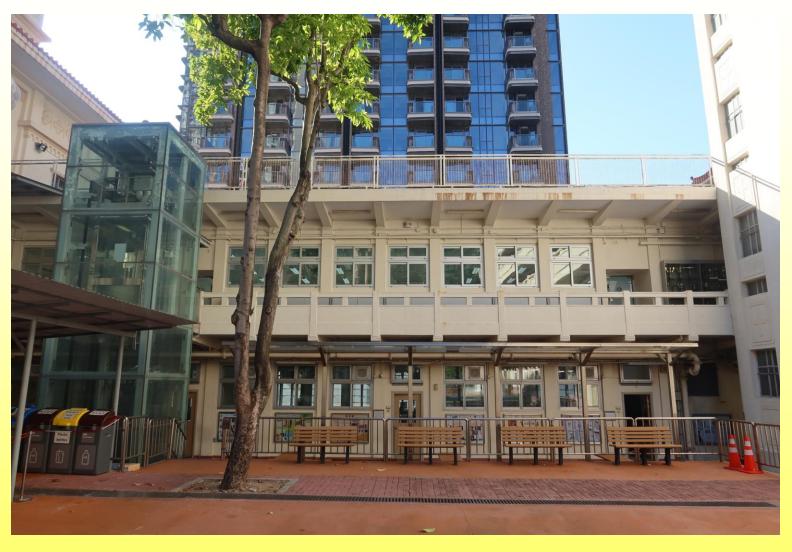

Historic Building Appraisal

St. Francis of Assisi's English Primary School (Old Block) No. 58 Shek Kip Mei Street, Sham Shui Po, Kowloon

Located at No. 58 Shek Kip Mei Street, the site is home to St. Francis of Historical Assisi's English Primary School (聖方濟各英文小學) and St. Francis of Assisi Interest Church (聖方濟各堂). The earliest building on the site, completed in 1955, was designed to integrate both the school and the church.

The establishment of the St. Francis of Assisi's English Primary School is closely intertwined with the history of the St. Francis of Assisi Church. The current church is the third generation, which traces its origins back to St. Francis Xavier Church (聖方濟各沙勿略堂), built in the late 1860s near Kowloon City. The original site on which the first church stood was dedicated exclusively to religious functions but was resumed by the government in 1930 to make way for the expansion of the airport at Kai Tak. In 1937, a new church, The Five Wounds of St. Francis of Assisi Church (聖五傷方濟各堂), was subsequently built at No. 10 Kak Hang Tsun Road (隔坑村道 10 號) in Kowloon City. This new building served not only as a place for worship but also housed a school named Da Tung School (大同學校),2 illustrating the fact that the practice of integrating a church and a school on the same site had already begun at that time. In 1943, however, both the church and the school were demolished by the Japanese army to facilitate further expansion of the Kai Tak aerodrome during the Japanese occupation.³ In 1953, thanks to the tireless efforts of

the Catholic Diocese of Hong Kong, the government granted a new site in Sham Shui Po,4 where the church and school stand today. Sham Shui Po was chosen as the location because of its rapidly growing Catholic population and the urgent need for educational facilities in the district, which had recently become home to many Chinese migrants and refugees whose children often lacked access to formal schooling.⁵ The establishment of a new school aimed to provide these children with education opportunities. Continuing the approach adopted in the 1930s of combining religious and educational functions, the new building was designed to serve both purposes. Construction was initially scheduled to commence after securing the land lease on 15 December 1953.⁶ However, the project was delayed due to the Shek Kip Mei Fire that broke out on 25 December of that year. Temporary shelters for fire victims and contractor sheds for the construction of resettlement blocks were erected on the new site, postponing the building work until late November 1954.8 The school section was completed first in September 1955, followed by the adjoining church three months later, in December.⁹ The newly built school was named St. Francis of Assisi's School (聖方濟各學校) and officially opened for admission upon its completion.¹⁰

The school has operated as a private, non-profit institution since its

establishment. By 1956, it had grown rapidly, enrolling over 1,000 students. 11 To support the local community, 15 percent of places were reserved for pupils from deprived families who did not have to pay fees as long as they maintained good conduct and academic results. 12 Initially, the school offered both morning and afternoon sessions across twelve classrooms, along with evening classes from 7 to 9 PM in English and free classes in Chinese. 13 The morning session offered primary-level classes in English, while afternoon classes were taught in Cantonese. 14 As student enrollment continued to rise and space became increasingly limited, an extension to the original building was constructed and completed in 1962. The two sessions were subsequently reorganised into separate schools, with the morning classes conducted under the name St. Francis of Assisi's English Primary School (聖方濟各英文小學) and the afternoon classes under the name St. Francis of Assisi's Caritas School (聖方 濟愛德小學).15 In 1999, the afternoon classes were relocated to No. 221 Nam Cheong Street, 16 while the morning session adopted a full-day schedule, an arrangement that continues today.

The school and the church are physically connected, both designed by Chien Architectural Nai Jen (錢乃仁), 17 a prominent Chinese architect of the time. Compared to the *Merit* church, the two-storey school section is modest and utilitarian in design. The front façade is characterised by regularly spaced windows in a pattern that culminates at a bell tower at the corner of Shek Kip Mei Street and Berwick Street. While this tower is notably shorter than the church's bell tower, the design remains consistent as they

both incorporate similar architectural elements. The tower is crowned with a cross and a hipped roof clad in orange-red tiles with a decorative band beneath the overhanging eaves. The two sides facing the street feature a long narrow arched window framed by a window trim. All of these details mirror the decorative design of the church's tower.

In contrast, the front façade of the school has relatively few decorative elements compared to the church. The only notable feature is found above the first-floor windows, where a pair of motifs resembling Chinese sparrow braces (雀替) adorn either side of the pilaster. The fence wall, which originally spanned the entire front façade, is topped by a row of bricks with a cross pattern that reflects the school's The southeast-facing façade, overlooking the ball court, religious background. connects to a cantilevered balcony corridor on the first floor, which is enclosed by a railing and sheltered by eaves supported by cantilevered beams. The old block of the school now houses classrooms and a staff room. The interior design is also utilitarian and is not marked by any notable architectural features, and it has been upgraded with modernised, contemporary fittings.

Over the years, the school has undergone extensive alterations and additions, Authenticity & significantly compromising its original appearance. Among the more significant Rarity changes is the addition of a lift tower facing the ball court to provide barrier-free access to the first floor. This installation resulted in the removal of part of the original railing along the corridor. Additionally, one of the ground-floor classrooms along the front façade has been converted into transformer and switch rooms. Consequently, a portion of the fence wall located outside these rooms, originally topped with the row of bricks with a cross pattern, was removed to allow access to these rooms in compliance with current building regulations. The bell tower's narrow arched windows have also been retrofitted with new aluminium frames, altering their original appearance. Furthermore, the construction of the extension in 1962 inevitably disrupted the building fabric of the 1955 school section, as the new addition was physically connected to the original building. Classrooms have been renovated to meet modern standards, including the replacement of all windows with aluminium ones and the installation of an air conditioning system. The interior walls of all the four classrooms on the first floor have also been knocked down to create a larger staff room, altering the original spatial layout of the building. Collectively, these modifications have compromised the architectural integrity of the school, and its authenticity has been largely diminished as a result.

Apart from the bell tower, which blends Chinese and western architectural features, the utilitarian design of St. Francis of Assisi's English Primary School is

typical of other schools built in the 1950s and is not considered uncommon architecturally.

St. Francis of Assisi's English Primary School has played a vital role in Social Value nurturing generations of children, particularly during the post-war years when poverty was widespread. By providing access to education for families with limited means, Interest it ensured that children in the area were not deprived of learning opportunities due to financial hardship, hence fostering social mobility. This initiative highlights the school's enduring commitment to education and its mission to uplift the community.

& Local

Religious education is incorporated into the school's formal curriculum with support from the St. Francis of Assisi Church. Religious practices and regular activities are held at the school to encourage the pupils' faith, 18 while some of the school's important ceremonies and masses are also conducted in the adjoining church, where pupils play an active part in roles such as altar servers and prayer leaders. 19

In combination with the Precious Blood Convent (Grade 2) and Precious Group Value Blood Hospital (Caritas) (Grade 3), the building stands as a testament to the spread of Catholicism in Sham Shui Po. More broadly, the school features a group value with other Catholic schools, including Maryknoll Convent School (Declared Monument), St. Mary's Canossian College (Grade 1) and Tang King Po School (Grade 3), which together reflect the Catholic Church's commitment to providing education services in Kowloon from the early to mid-20th century.

Geographically, it is located within walking distance of a number of built heritage, including the Ex-Sham Shui Po Service Reservoir (Grade 1), Mei Ho House (Grade 2), the Former North Kowloon Magistracy (Grade 2) and the Building of The Garden Company, Limited (Grade 2).
